UPDATES FROM AROUND THE COUNTY

SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (SNAP)

Beginning November 1, no funding will be available for those receiving SNAP benefits. This will severely impact Montezuma County as:

- 4912 residents receive SNAP in Montezuma County
- Of those receiving SNAP benefits, 50% are children, 15% elderly, 10% disabled
- On average, \$894,000 per month comes into our county through these monthly benefits -- sometimes more.

We have confirmed that Safeway, City Market, and Walmart will continue to accept EBT cards that still have available funds; small local groceries should accept such cards as well. Our local food banks, as well as Hope's and Grace's Kitchens, are expecting increased demand. If you have been wondering how you might give back to your community, here are several suggestions:

The Good Samaritan Food Bank is in dire need of volunteers. They
are overwhelmed right now, and while they won't have time for
formal training, if you are good at jumping in and getting things
done, stop by any week day, 10:00-5:00 and ask how you can

Kelli Hargraves, Montezuma County Director of Social Services, is working with all those organizations in the county that address food insecurity to come up with a county-wide plan to co-ordinate fundraising and food drives so that we have the food resources we need to keep our citizens fed. In addition to the current curtailment of SNAP benefits, SNAP will be reduced in the future due to HR.1, the "big, beautiful bill." An additional stressor on the system will be those federal employees currently furloughed and receiving no pay checks. They will be in need of food resources to carry them over until they can return to work.

NO KINGS RALLY WRAP-UP

Cortez residents (at least 854 strong!) joined an estimated 8.2 million people at No Kings rallies on October 18, 2025. This No Kings rally was the biggest one day rally in United States history. There were 2700 rallies in all 50 states. Rally goers in Cortez stretched from the Colorado Welcome Center to City Market with people on both sides of the street. People came dressed as Aunt Ifa, a squid, Winnie the Pooh, King George III, to name a few. The day was bright and sunny. People were glad to be with others to stand up for democracy and against kings.

Denver had 30,000 participants; New York City had 100,000; San Diego, at least 25,000; Chicago's estimate was from 10,000 to 100,000. Think about this—a few groups put out the word that there should be a rally on a certain date and 8.2 million people are engaged enough to answer that call. Key organizers across the country were Indivisible, 50501 Movement, MoveOn, United We Dream, League of Conservation Voters, and Reproductive Freedom for All to name a few. The national League of Women Voters and the League of Women Voters in Montezuma County encouraged citizens to participate.

"The number 8.5 million is the estimated number of voters it would take to bring about change through nonviolent protests. This is based on the following finding from the Carr-Ryan Center for Human Rights:

'Nonviolent protests are twice as likely to succeed as armed conflicts...and those engaging a threshold of 3.5% of the population have never failed to bring about change.' According to the University of Florida approximately 245 million Americans were eligible to vote in the 2024 general election. According to the above research, if 3.5% of these eligible voters—8,575,000 people – engage in nonviolent protests, we will bring about meaningful change."


